Hotline	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Confidentiality</li><li>Anonymous</li><li>Trained Volunteers</li><li>Available 24/7</li><li>Great for listening</li><li>Great for crises</li><li>Free</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>No face-to-face interactions</li><li>Trained volunteers but not licensed professionals</li><li>Not for a long-term solution</li></ul>
Spiritual Leader	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Can address your problems through a spiritual lens</li><li>Most likely has a pre-existing relationship with you</li><li>Trained to listen</li><li>May help you find meaning and offer hope</li><li>Free</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>May not be a licensed professional</li><li>While they are free, they may have limited resources</li><li>They are not a mental health expert</li></ul>
Coach	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Most likely a pre-existing relationship with you</li><li>Great listening skills</li><li>Free</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Not a licensed professional</li><li>Limited availability</li></ul>
Private Therapy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Licensed and trained in mental health</li><li>Great listening</li><li>Offers sound advice</li><li>Provides therapy and treatment unique to your needs</li><li>Can provide diagnosis and prescriptions if necessary</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Can be expensive and may require insurance</li><li>Limited to their offered office hours</li><li>Can take a few tries to find the right therapist</li><li>Can be difficult to find someone with the ability to take on new clients</li></ul>

School Counselor	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Great listeners</li><li>Available during school hours</li><li>Can build a relationship across many years</li><li>Confidentiality</li><li>More frequent check-ins; could help maintain progress</li><li>Can handle a crisis or consult with social worker or psychologist</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Does not diagnose or provide long-term treatment</li><li>Has an academically focused lens</li><li>Limits to confidentiality – may need to inform your parents or other authorities</li></ul>
School Social Worker or School Psychologist	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Provides short-term counseling</li><li>Can coordinate and refer outside resources</li><li>Available during school hours</li><li>Has mental health training and assessment skills</li><li>Confidentiality</li><li>Has a better understanding of your environment</li><li>Can handle a crisis</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Does not diagnose or provide long-term treatment</li><li>Limits to confidentiality – may need to inform your parents or other authorities</li><li>Limited availability</li></ul>
Teacher or Trusted Staff Member	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Most likely has a pre-existing relationship with you</li><li>Has access to school support staff if needed (i.e counselor or social worker)</li><li>Potentially sees you on a regular basis</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Does not diagnose or provide long-term treatment</li><li>Limits to confidentiality – may need to inform your parents or other authorities</li><li>Limited availability</li><li>Lack of mental health training</li><li>Is not trained to handle a crisis</li></ul>
Friends	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Understanding</li><li>Care about you unconditionally</li><li>Knows you well</li><li>Can relate to you and share experiences</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Not a trained professional</li><li>May not know what resources to recommend to you</li></ul>
Family	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Loves you unconditionally</li><li>Have a history with you</li><li>Gateway to additional resources (i.e private therapy)</li><li>Listens</li><li>Knows your home environment</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Not a trained professional</li><li>May not know what resources to recommend to you</li><li>Lack of education around mental health conditions can pose barriers to accessing resources</li></ul>

## Identifying & Utilizing Resources – Activity 2

### Scenarios:

#### 1. Stress and Not Sleeping
